1 To identify a signer using "Satisfactory Evidence," what is required?

B. A credible witness or identifying documents,

Satisfactory evidence means the absence of information leading the notary to believe ID is false, and relies on proper ID cards or credible witnesses.

2 Is a Social Security Card acceptable identification?

B. No,

A Social Security Card is NOT valid identification.

3 Two credible witnesses:

Two credible witnesses are allowed and must present ID; they don't necessarily need to be over 21 (just competent) or fingerprinted.

4 An oath is:

An oath is a solemn spoken pledge; an affirmation is its legal equivalent.

Acknowledgments are the most common.

Performing acts constituting the practice of law is prohibited.

RON allows a notary to notarize documents for a remotely located signer using two-way audio-visual communication technology.

In virtually all U.S. states a notary must take a formal oath of office before performing any notarial acts. This oath swears or affirms the notary to faithfully perform their official duties.

A Signature by Mark allows individuals who cannot write their name due to a disability or illiteracy to use a mark (typically an X) as a legally valid signature, witnessed by others.

If the signer is not personally known or identified by a credible witness, the notary must use a government-issued ID card or US passport.

A notary public is a disinterested impartial witness. They must have no personal or financial stake in the outcome of any transaction they notarize.
